Cranium Calisthenics*

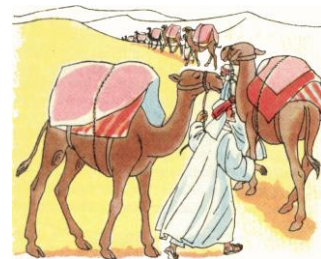
"Here is a more interesting one," said Scheherazade. "A man was being tried for having robbed a caravan. Three witnesses came forth and made the following statements:
